In July we had various events taking place at The Riddy such as recognising 'World Drowning Prevention Day' on 25th July and 'Meet the cows' on 29th July.

For World Drowning Prevention Day, Bedfordshire Fire and Rescue service helped to raise awareness of drowning incidents following a recent near miss. A sign was installed at the site and Sandy Fire Station offered throw line training with the local community.

Did you know...the history of Sandy mill?

The first reference to a mill at Sandy, not surprisingly, is in the Domesday Book of 1086; it refers to two mills (one perhaps in the lost village of Kinwick), but this could well have meant two sets of millstones in the one building rather than two separate buildings. It must have meant a water mill by the River Ivel, as there were no windmills in the country at this time, and it would have belonged to the manor at Sandy Place - the "e" was added much later. In 1219 the mill passed to the ownership of Henry, son of Hugh, de Beauchamp and in 1271 there is a reference to a man drowning there whilst fishing. By 1735 Sir Humphrey Monoux was the owner, in 1805 it passed to Elizabeth - the widow of Philip Monoux - and Charles Pope is recorded as the miller in 1850. He rebuilt the mill (in 1857) and built Park House. In the early 20th Century (the photo dates from the 1920s) it was owned by the Walker family and, later, Sidney Banks, but fell out of use during the 1960s and was demolished in 1977.





Humans of Sandy



This season we caught up with Lewis Smart who rides in a Support Class in the Bennetts British Superbike Championship. If you know anyone who would like to feature in our winter newsletter, please get in touch.

Tell us about your relation to Sandy...

I have always lived in Sandy along with my parents, grandparents, aunties, and uncles! My Grandad used to race minis when he was younger, and his race number was number 32 which is why I decided to use the number as my race number. The Smart Racing team is family run team. Mum oversees admin, Dad does all prep and mechanical work, and my sister helps with the cooking!

Explain to us more about Motorcycle racing...

I have been involved in motorcycle racing for the last 3 years. It was always something that I thought about, as I'd studied to be a race technician at Silverstone MotorSport College. My dad's mates raced bikes and so I took an interest and started club racing on the CB500 in 2020 where I managed to finish 3rd in the Championship in my Freshman year. I managed to win the CB500 Sportsman Championship in 2022 which was a massive achievement. After winning the CB500 Championship, I decided I wanted to push myself and take the next step into the British level. I now ride a Ninja400 in the HEL Performance Junior Supersport Class which is a support class in the Bennetts British Superbikes, all races are televised on Eurosport. My biggest achievement this year was getting my first British Podium where I secured a 3rd Place at Snetterton. I work full time in Peterborough at Wheels Motorcycles and race at weekends, the season runs March to October, so I spend most weekends exploring different tracks!

Where do you see yourself going in the superbike world?

I would like to keep continuing my racing career by progressing onto higher levels and other bikes. I do ride a higher capacity bike in Endurance racing so this is something to consider in the future.

Have you ever had any accidents doing this sport?

I've had a few crashes but nothing too serious. When you crash, you are out of the race, so I've had to learn the hard way through these accidents to be consistent and not too aggressive.
